## PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Bethany Parents and Carers,

In her book, *The Black Dress*, Pamela Freeman has this rather delightful image to put into our minds:

"Poor little sad soul! Sister Aloysius sent him to me that first week. I was standing in the playground, looking down at the mangroves and the bay, relishing the fresh salt air. Mick, his name was, came sliding up to me reluctantly, eyes down, terror in every movement.

'Sister says I have to tell you,' he said in a quavering voice. He gulped. 'I stole a bun in the kitchen.' God love him! I almost laughed. But I put my arm around him. 'Were you hungry?' He nodded. He was twisting his hands together in a combination of misery and fright. That movement alone told of months of abuse and fear. 'Well, you go back to Sister and tell her I said to give you another bun.' His head came up, astonished, and he met my eyes for the first time. I smiled. He grinned and hugged me hard and raced off to Sister Aloysius, leaping as he went. Then, I did laugh."

Mary Mackillop's action towards little Mick was one of total kindness. A century later, Mother Teresa made a statement so relevant to Mary Mackillop's action when she said, ***"Let no one ever come to you without leaving better and happier. Be the living expression of God's kindness, kindness in your face, kindness in your eyes, kindness in your smile."***

The Roman Emperor, Julian, (355-363) tried desperately to limit the influence of growing numbers of Christians but reluctantly, made this observation about them: "As children are coaxed with cake, so have these Christians enticed the poor to join them by their kindness. Strangers they have secured by hospitality. By brotherly love they have won the multitude." John Abbott. *The History of Christianity*.

## PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE CONTINUED

If we are to take too much notice of the sensational side of media reporting, we might begin to doubt our personal safety in a ruthless society where kindness is, seemingly, becoming such a rare commodity. Perhaps media reports could include a few words from St Paul such as, *"Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger along with every form of malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another."* Eph. 4:31,32.

As parents, we all know how self-absorbed young people can be. It's part of their development, discovering their own identity and deciding who they want to be. It's quite possible that they might think that because they are "family", they are entitled to get what they want, when they want it, even if it means that their selfishness is to the disadvantage of other family members. They will need strong parent models from whom they can learn by observation and influence that they need to be more aware of other family members and their needs, their feelings and their concerns. They will need to be lead from self-absorption to sensitivity of others, so that kindness becomes part of their nature as they mature towards adulthood. Here's a thought to keep at the back of your mind: *"You cannot do a kindness too soon, for you never know how soon it will be too late."* Author Unknown.

*God our Father, we thank you for your "random act of kindness" that enabled us to have the children we do. Help us to establish kindness in our household, so it is found in our words, our attitudes and behaviours. Amen.*

We wish to thank the senior students who volunteered their time in service of our community, namely McCarthy Catholic College, Caroline Chisholm College and St Donimic's College.

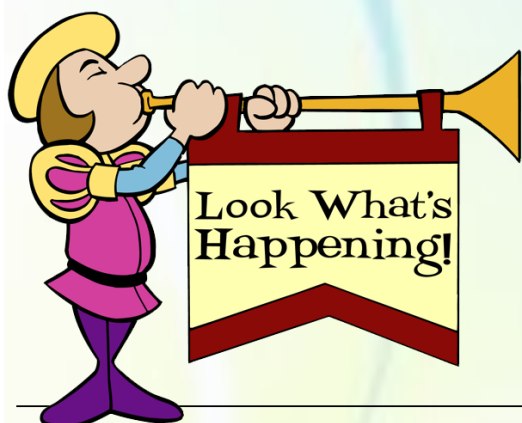
We wish to acknowledge the Bethany staff who supported the event in different capacities.

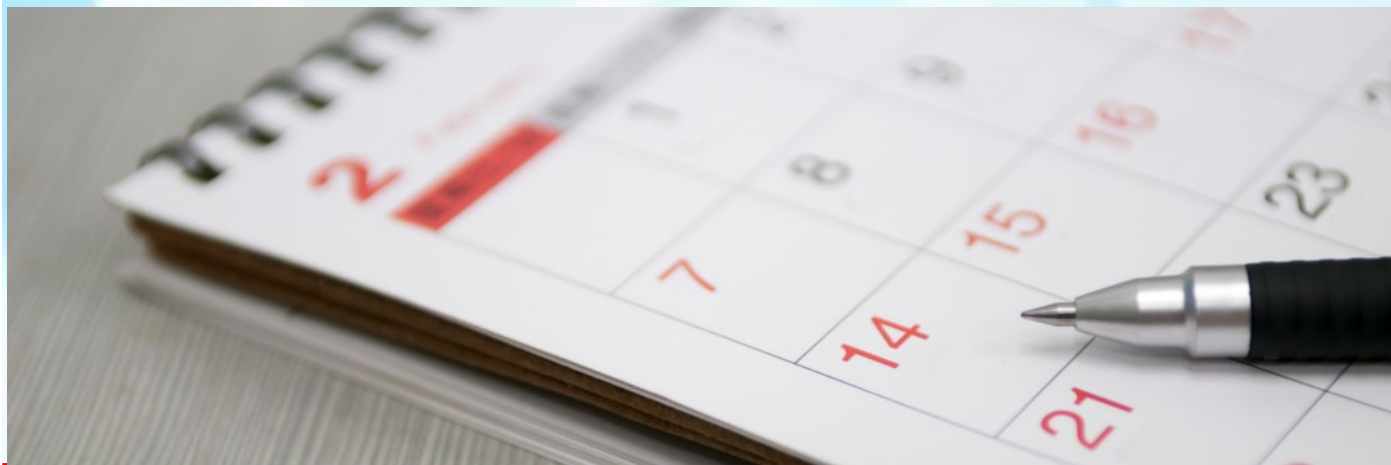

## Mission Possible

### Stage 3 Project Based Learning



**Project Based Learning** is a teaching and learning method in which students gain knowledge and skills by working for an extended period of time to investigate and respond to an authentic, engaging and complex question, problem, or challenge.

This term the Stage 3 students developed their understanding and appreciation of Christian mission and showed how they can respond to God's love, through the strength of the Holy Spirit, in their everyday lives.

The Driving Question, which lead the students throughout the unit was - ***“How can we, as promoters of mission, develop a campaign so that we can create awareness of social injustices around the world?”***

Students engaged in individual and group tasks throughout the 4 week unit. In groups they chose and researched a social injustice which they would base their project around. They learnt all about designing effective persuasive posters as a basis to attract and engage an audience. *In groups, they had the opportunity to work collaboratively using technology to create authentic final products.*



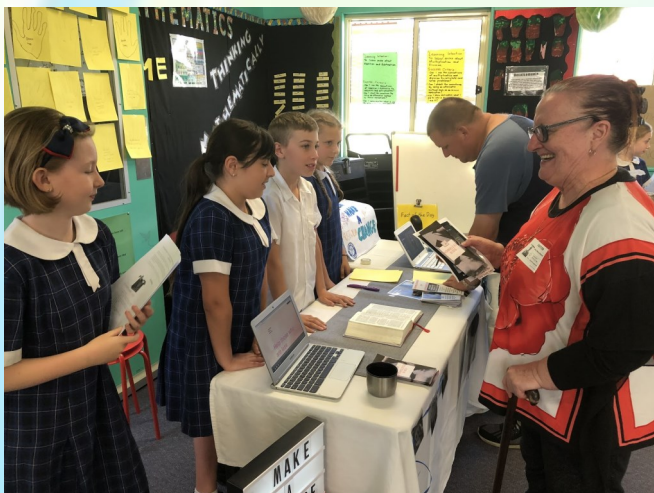




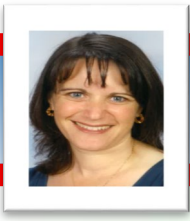
## RE - Mrs Cignarella

# LITERACY - Mrs Baldacchino

## *What has been happening with literacy this week at Bethany?*

Last week, the parents of the new Kindergarten students for 2018 participated in a workshop with a focus on Literacy. This workshop covered:

- agreed practices in teaching the three strands of literacy at Bethany (Reading and Viewing, Writing and Representing and Speaking and Listening),
- information about the daily 2 hour literacy block,
- writing development in Kindergarten including letter formation and an insight into how spelling is taught,
- hints and ideas for reading with young children,
- the importance that Speaking and Listening plays in a child's literacy development.

At the end of the workshop, Parents responded with comments including:

"I learned there are a number of ways to work out how to spell a word beyond 'sounding it out'.

"Reading everyday is important."

"Reading is important and I'm going to read everyday to my child."

"Great insights into speech and language."

"Students who are not read to have 1000 words less than students who are read to."

This week, the Bethany staff reviewed the school literacy goal for 2017 and began the process of formulating a literacy goal for 2018. In reviewing the current goal, some aspects were identified as necessary to be continued and will become priority learnings in 2018. The 2018 literacy goal will be published in later editions of the newsletter.

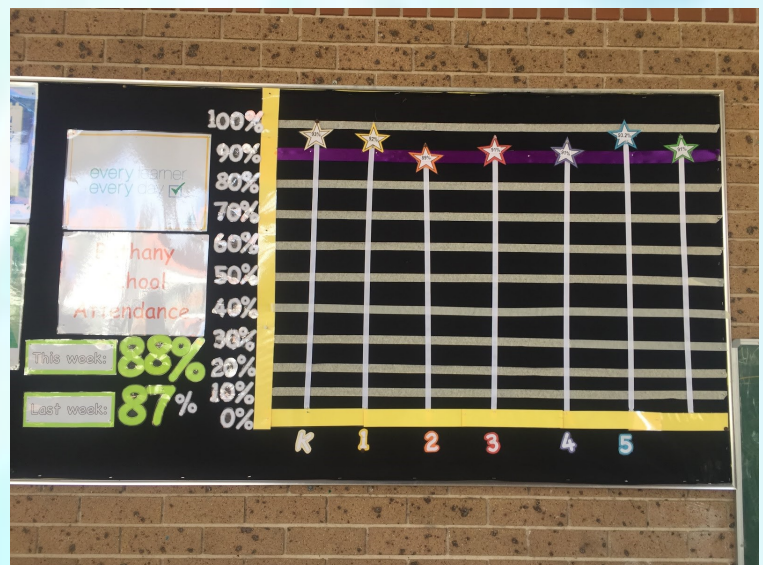

# Road safety-Mrs Lazare



## Be Bus Aware Bus Safety Week 6-12 November 2017

NSW Bus Safety Week will be held from **6-12 November 2017** to highlight the importance of bus-related safety issues for all road users. Bethany is reminding everyone to 'Be Bus Aware'. This campaign aims to reinforce the road rules relating to buses to the community and promote safer on-road interactions between pedestrians, motorists, bicycle riders and buses. ### We all have a part to play

Our Be Bus Aware campaign highlights the importance of bus safety for all road users. Buses are large, heavy vehicles and can't stop quickly. Each year, Bus Safety Week helps raise awareness for all road users on how to stay safe on and around buses, helping to reduce injuries and fatalities.

### Pedestrians

Pedestrians made up the largest group of bus fatalities over the 2012 to 2016 period. Bus Safety Week promotes safety for pedestrians, who should:

- Plan ahead and don't rush for the bus
- Follow the rules and cross with care
- Avoid being distracted by mobile devices
- Stand back from the kerb when waiting for a bus.

### Adults always hold your child's hand when crossing the road

School-aged children might seem independent, but they still need a hand.

Remember:

- Always meet your child AT school or the bus stop. NEVER wait on the opposite side of the road and call them across.
- Always supervise your child and hold their hand when walking to and from the bus stop or interchange and when crossing the road until they are at least 10 years of age.
- Wait until the bus has gone then use a safe place to cross the road.



### Drivers

We know that because of their sheer size and mass, buses cause severe outcomes for other road users in crashes. Buses can't stop quickly and drivers should:

- Give way to buses
- Not merge too closely in front of buses
- Slow down to 40 km/h when bus lights are flashing

### Cyclists

- If you are overtaking a bus, avoid passing it when it is turning - buses can take up more than one lane when they turn
- You may travel in a Bus Lane, Tram Lane, Transit Lane or Truck Lane but not in a Bus Only Lane
- Follow the rules and ride with care



### Passengers

More than one quarter of all seriously injured bus passengers are aged 70 years or over. If you are older, have a disability or are pregnant, try to sit closer to the front of the bus or in a courtesy seat. All bus passengers should:

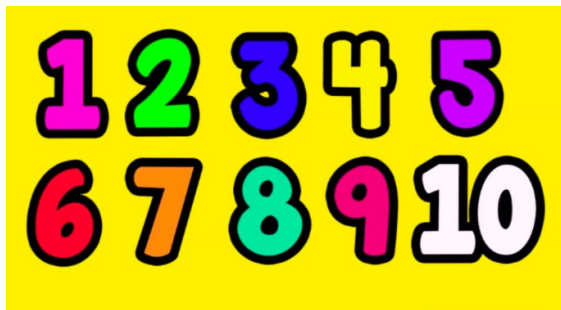
- Press the button well before your stop to give the driver plenty time to stop safely
- Wait until the bus has stopped before you get out of your seat





# NUMERACY- Mrs Dowlan

## NUMERACY NEWS Term 4 Week 4



As mentioned in the last newsletter, teachers have been contributing activities towards achieving our school goal in numeracy on visualisation.

Today what I share with you are some tasks that students from Year 3 and 4 have been accessing for number. You might like to try these at home and see how your child is using visualisation as a strategy to help them solve mathematical problems.

### Year 3

#### Whole Number Counting and Place Value

##### Alphabetical Numbers

Say numbers names 1-10 in alphabetical order without writing anything down (Eight, five, four, nine, one, seven, six, ten, three, two) a variation would be to say the months of year in alphabetical order without writing anything down

##### Hundreds Chart Visualisation

'Picture in your head': Ask your child to picture a hundred chart in their head. Ask questions such as: what number lies above 48? Below 74? 2 to the left of 16?

##### Addition and Subtraction

**Coin Combinations** Imagine what coins could you put together to make \$1

##### Multiplication and Division

##### Array Visualisation

Children are given a number and visualise how this may look if shared into equal groups (may be groups/arrays etc). Eg I have 12 cookies to put on an oven tray. I want the same number of cookies in each row.. How may this look? 20 students in even rows - what might this look like?

##### Array Game

2 dice, roll - visualise the array you could make and draw it on grid paper, First person to fill the graph paper wins.

Further visualisation questions: What do you need to roll to win?

### Year 4

#### Multiplication and Division

##### Dice Multiplication:

Player rolls 2 dice. The first dice is the number of groups to make and the second is how many in each group. Visualise what it will look like and predict the total.

Use counters (objects) to make a model of the situation.

Children predict the total and then prove.

Imagine one more group/one less group.

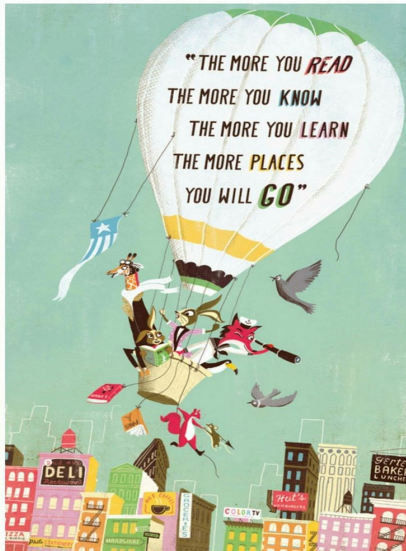

Many of our students have enjoyed this experience and developed their critical thinking and problem solving skills whilst working collaboratively and sharing amongst their peers.

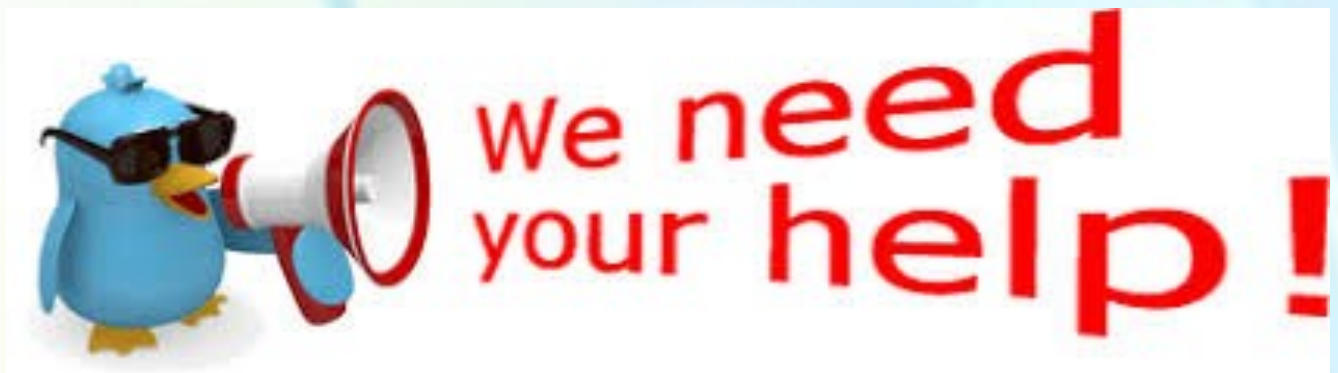

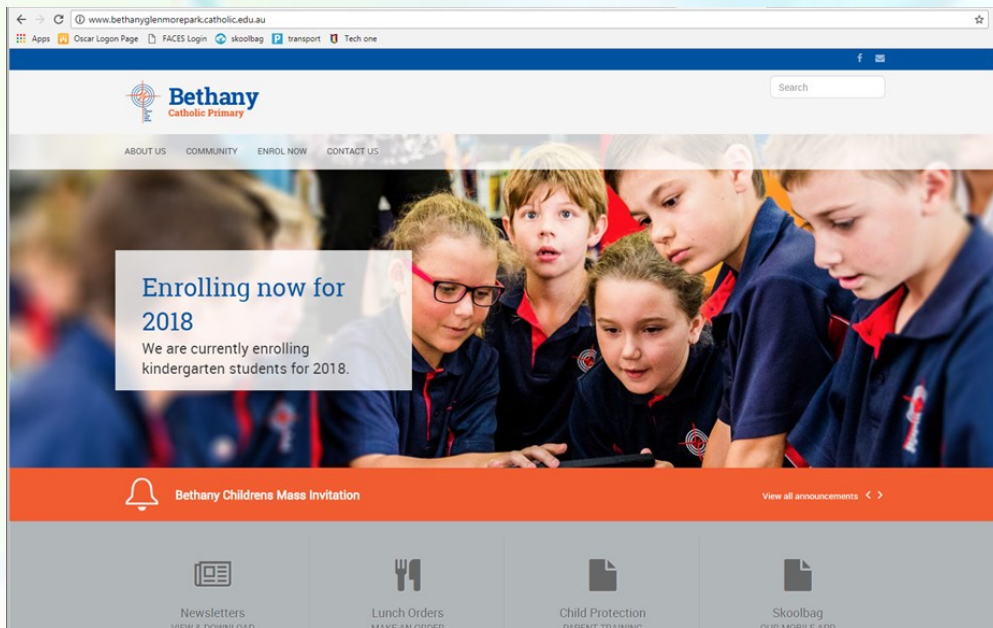

Annual Diocesan Tuition Fees can be paid upfront at the start of the year or as three equal payments in Terms 1, 2 and 3. The fee is only charged for the first three (3) children currently enrolled in the diocese (in other words there is no additional Diocesan Tuition Fee for the fourth child attending a systemic school in the diocese or other participating Catholic schools(see 'Sibling Discounts' below). To work out how much the fee is for each child, check the table below.

payable in three equal instalments of \$261 payable in terms one, two and three.***

## DISCOUNTS ON FEES

Catholic schools in the Diocese of Parramatta are committed to providing an affordable quality Catholic education for families. We understand the financial demands placed on families and seek to keep the fees as low as possible. No child who meets the enrolment criteria will be refused enrolment or disadvantaged because of a family's financial circumstances.

There are very significant discounts for the second (25% reduction) and third (50% reduction) children enrolled from the one family. There are no fees for the fourth and subsequent children.

# BUS APPLICATIONS

Applications for 2018 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) and Term Bus Pass (TBP) travel entitlements are now open.

In coming days students who hold an SSTS entitlement and are changing grade bands i.e. going from year 2 to 3 or year 6 to 7 and changing school, and students whose entitlement was approved under a medical condition, will receive notification by email or post informing them of the pending expiry of their entitlement. TBP holders will also receive notification.

Students enquiring about pending cancellation should be advised to go online to <https://apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/updateDetails> to update details/make application for next year's entitlement.

Application needs to be made before 31 December 2017 to ensure their entitlement is updated and their current card is not cancelled. If application is made after the expiry of their entitlement (31 December) the system will automatically cancel their card and a new one will need to be issued.

**Please note:** Students who are changing grade band and are remaining at the same school will not receive notification and do not need to reapply (the system now automatically validates a student's on-going eligibility if at the same school and going from infants to primary or primary to secondary). Where a student meets the new eligibility the system will automatically update their entitlement and card.

Students in the Opal area applying for a SSTS or TBP entitlement for the first time will receive their card (posted to the nominated address) a week or two before the commencement of 2018 classes. Please let students know new cards for 2018 are not posted in 2017 or during the Christmas / New Year period.

Students residing in Rural and Regional (R&R) areas are expected to receive their new travel pass at the commencement of the New School Year. **Note:** not all R&R operators issue passes (often in smaller communities where the student is known a pass is not issued).
