

Dear Parents and Carers,

After twelve weeks of remote learning I'm sure you and your children are feeling a range of different emotions. The teachers and staff are feeling the same way too. However, we are definitely feeling very excited to be welcoming our students back to face to face learning over the next two weeks and having the school environment return to normal - a school is not a school without the students!

We are also feeling so very grateful! Grateful to our students who have worked so hard and shown great resilience, to our staff and colleagues who have collaborated and demonstrated great flexibility and creativity and also to all of our wonderful parents and carers.

All parents and carers of school students have done something truly remarkable this past term and I believe they need to be acknowledged for it.

Over the past twelve weeks I have spoken to many parents with differing circumstances. In the Church Liturgical Year, the month of October is dedicated to The Holy Rosary. The feast of The Holy Rosary is celebrated on October 7th.

The Holy Rosary is a prayer which, according to Catholic tradition, began when the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to St Dominic in the early 13th century and instructed him on how to use a set of beads to pray.

The Holy Rosary is a prayer that not only honours the Blessed Virgin Mary, but it also provides us with an outline of the entire life of Jesus Christ.

Did you know: the word 'Rosary' is taken from the Latin word "rosarium" meaning "rose garden"?

During Religious Education lessons in Term 4, students at Bethany will begin new learning cycles which will be taught for the duration of the term. Each of the learning cycles will focus on the areas of Mission, Advent and Christmas. The following is an overview of the learning that each grade will be engaging in this term:

GRADE	OVERARCHING QUESTION	CONTENT
Kindergarten	Which scriptures from the Bible tell us who Jesus is and what he did?	 The Bible is a very special book through which God speaks to us today. The Scriptures are stories about God's love for his People. The Gospels contain stories of Jesus and people who believed in him. The story of Jesus is found in the Gospels.
Year 1	How can we grow our relationship with Jesus?	 Jesus is the Son of God and son of Mary. Jesus showed us God's love. Jesus is our brother and friend. Jesus showed us how God wants us to live. Jesus sends God's love into our hearts through the Holy Spirit.
Year 2	How does scripture from the Bible help us appreciate God's everlasting love?	 The Bible is a very special book through which God speaks to us today. The Scriptures are stories about God's love for his people. The Gospels contain stories of Jesus and people who believed in him. The story of Jesus is found in the Gospels.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION CONT'D

Year 3	How does prayer help us understand important events in the liturgical year?	 Prayer is a very important way through which we grow in closeness to God. Prayer involves ritual, symbols and celebrations. When we pray, God is present and active, especially when the Church celebrates the Eucharist. Our prayer is inspired by the feasts and seasons of the liturgical year. There are various traditional and contemporary cultural forms of devotion to Mary and the saints.
Year 4	What connections can we make between stories from the Bible and our life experiences?	 The Bible contains the books of the Old Testament and the New Testament. The Scriptures proclaim the Good News of Jesus' life, death and resurrection. The Scriptures help us to reflect on our lives and to respond in prayer and action.
Year 5	What connections can we make between stories from the Bible, current world issues and our personal experiences?	 The Scriptures are inspired by the Holy Spirit. The Scriptures tell the story of God's saving love for us and challenges us to live Christian lives. The Scriptures comprise different types of sacred stories and writings which reveal important religious truths.
Year 6	How can we use prayer to guide our mission and express our devotion to God during different liturgical feasts and seasons.	 Prayer is a means of recognising the centrality of God in our lives. Prayer helps us to live a life like that of Jesus. We pray as we celebrate the Church's liturgical feasts and seasons.
